A letter from the Mayor



The state of the City as we transition into 2022 is one that has many of us excited. There are several areas that we have prioritized that we believe provide an outlook that can best be described as optimistic and confident. The first area is the intentionality in preparing for our growth and community's evolving needs, both now and moving forward. This encompasses many areas such as infrastructure, public safety, city buildings, as well as resident and business services. In looking at last year and our infrastructure investments, one big project comes to mind and that is Kinney Avenue.

While painfully overdue with contractor delays, the outcome is one that I believe we can recognize as a huge improvement to the safety of all who drive, bike, or walk that stretch. Throughout Walker, you will find these older country-style roads that were adequate for our days as a township or smaller rural city. However, we are no longer either of these as we have evolved into a mid-size suburban city. Kinney between Three Mile Road and Waldorf was representative of those old rural country types of roads. What we see there now is a deliverable that represents what our City has become and what it needs to be. In 2021, we continued to make significant investments in our roads. In addition to the state-provided Act 51 monies, the City also spent more than \$1 million on the upkeep of our local roads. In looking to the coming years, we plan on following that same strategy.

As far as public safety goes, I know it remains our top focus. As policymakers and budget-setters, we need to make sure they have the resources they need to provide us with a community that is safe and secure. In looking at last year's budget, and even a draft of the 2022-23 budget, you will see we continuously monitor staffing levels in both departments and make adjustments as necessary. Last year our calls for service for both police and fire returned to pre-pandemic levels and remained consistent with past years. However, we know the growth and evolving needs in our City require us to be vigilant about what is the right approach to the current needs and times.

In March, the City Commission will be holding a work session to discuss strategies and plans around a new Library and Community Center. Earlier this year, the Commission received a presentation from an architect and engineering firm that was based on resident input and identified city needs. I would expect that we will have more definitive plans of what this will look like, how we will pay for it, and when we will do it in the upcoming months. Of the two facts that we know, the first is that we have outgrown what is an incredibly small library for a city our size. Second, based on that same resident input there very clearly is demand for a community center with meeting and gathering spaces. Everyone benefits from a sense of community and neighborhood identity. Neither are easy to do right now with our current facilities. So, our call to action is to refine the plan and then execute on it.

Lastly, we continue to invest in upgrades to our city-provided services. A large part of this is technology, including a major upgrade to our website. If you have not noticed any changes, that is good! What is hard to miss is the ability to do more with our city services on the new website. The pandemic has reinforced that we need to be more responsive to our residents' needs through online information and services. If there are aspects of the website in which we could improve upon, we would love to hear from you. Our goal is to make it as user-friendly as possible.

As always, whether you are a resident or business here, thank you for making the choice to call Walker home.

2021 WALKER INCOME TAX RETURNS ARE DUE MAY 2, 2022

We will be happy to prepare your Walker return free of charge. Please call (616) 791-6880 for information.

WORK FROM HOME IN 2021

If you are a Walker resident who usually works in another city with an income tax (for example, Grand Rapids), you must reduce the credit for tax paid to the other city for days worked from home. You will also reduce the amount of tax you pay to the non-resident city by allocating your wages for days worked from home. If you need help calculating non-resident taxable wages or the credit for tax paid to another city, you can call us at (616) 791-6880.



E-FILE YOUR WALKER INCOME TAX RETURN

We will be accepting 2021 Walker resident and non-resident returns by e-file. If you use a paid tax preparer that e-files your federal and state return, they will be able to e-file your Walker return also. If you use TaxAct software/online tax program to prepare your own federal and state returns, you will be able to e-file your Walker return. Visit the TaxAct site at taxact.com for more information. Please note that other software/online tax programs used for self-prepared returns (TurboTax, H&R Block, TaxSlayer) do not participate with Michigan local e-filing as of 1/1/2022. We are working with these popular software programs to encourage them to participate with Michigan local e-filing. Check the instructions when you print your 2021 Walker return to see if you need to mail a paper copy to us. E-filed returns for tax year 2021 will be accepted beginning January 31, 2022. Processing of e-filed returns with refunds will not begin until mid-March. All W-2 forms due from employers by February 28 must be processed first.

ESTIMATED PAYMENTS

The first quarter estimated payment for 2022 Walker Income Tax is also due May 2, 2022. If your employer does not withhold Walker Income Tax or you have non-wage income (rental income, capital gains, premature pension distributions, etc.) that is subject to tax and you think you may owe more than \$100 with your 2022 return, you must make quarterly estimated payments. The 2022 Quarterly Estimated payment vouchers with instructions can be found:

You must pay in at least 70% of your current or prior year liability (whichever is lower) through timely estimates, credits or withholding to avoid receiving a bill for penalty and interest for underpayment of estimated tax. If you need help calculating safe estimates, please call us for assistance at (616) 791-6880.

Please note that paying all four 2022 quarterly estimates with the fourth quarter voucher due January 31, 2023 may result in a bill for penalty and interest for failure to pay timely estimates.

WHO MUST FILE

Every resident or part-year resident of Walker (this includes renters) who had taxable income in 2021 of \$600 or more must file a return. More information on taxable income can be found here: www.walkermi.gov/incomtaxfaqs.

All Walker addresses have Grand Rapids mailing addresses so please do not assume you are not a Walker resident based on your mailing address. To check whether your address is within Walker city limits, please visit www.walkermi.gov/streetdirectory.

If you have past years of Walker returns that you have forgotten to file, contact the tax department immediately at (616) 791-6880. If you file prior year returns and pay the tax and interest due, you may request a waiver of penalty. If the tax department contacts you first regarding unfiled returns, you will not be eligible for a waiver of penalty. We are continuing the process of electronically matching state of Michigan returns filed from a Walker resident address with Walker returns filed. If you have forgotten to file Walker returns from prior years, now is the time to get that cleared up before you receive an assessment from this compliance program.

CAN WE SEE YOUR ADDRESS?

If you called 911 for an emergency, could the agency responding find your home or business quickly and easily? If addresses are not prominently posted on mailboxes, posts, or buildings, it can be extremely difficult for fire, police, or ambulance personnel to find the location of an emergency at a time when every moment counts. If it is difficult to read your address from the street in front of your home or business, emergency responders could be delayed in reaching you. The Walker Fire and Police Departments strongly encourages all Walker residents to post their address prominently on their mailbox, home, or business so it is easily seen and recognizable from the road.

WE CAN HELP!

Green reflective address signs, measuring six inches by 18 inches, can be purchased from the Walker Firefighters' Association for \$10. The signs can be easily attached to a mailbox post, and the three-inch-tall reflective numbers allow for high visibility in the dark. If you would like to purchase a reflective address sign, please call the Walker Fire Department office at (616) 791-6840 Monday through Thursday from 7:30 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. and on Friday from 7:30 a.m. until 11:30 a.m.



FIRE SAFETY DURING WINTER STORMS

Winter storms can happen almost anywhere. They can cause us problems. Know what to do before, during and after a storm. This will help keep you and your family safe from a winter fire.

- Test all smoke alarms. Do this at least once a month. This way you will know they are working. Install carbon monoxide alarms in your home. Test the alarms.
- Plan two ways out of the home in case of an emergency.
- Clear driveway and front walk of ice and snow. This will provide easy access to your home.
- Make sure your house number can be seen from the street. If you need help, firefighters will be able to find you.
- Be ready in case the power goes out. Have flashlights, battery-powered lighting, and fresh batteries on hand. Never use candles.
- Stay aware of winter weather. Listen to the television or radio for updates, or download a weather app. Watch for bulletins online.
- Check on neighbors, especially the elderly and those who may need assistance.
- Generators should be used outdoors. Keep them away from windows, doors, and vents. Do not run a generator inside your garage, even if the door is open.
- Stay away from downed wires. Report any downed wires to authorities.
- Be ready if the heat stops working. Use extra layers of clothes and blankets to stay warm. If you use an emergency heat source, keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet away.
- Turn portable heaters off when you go leave the room and when you go to bed.

There are more home fires in winter than in any other season. Half of all home heating fires happen in December, January and February. As you stay cozy and warm this winter season, be fire smart! Nearly half of all space heater fires involve electric space heaters.

KIDS AND SOCIAL MEDIA

Our area has not been immune to the lingering fallout from the Oxford school shooting. Our officers & detectives continue to follow up on school threats, some coming from elementary schools. We'd like this letter to serve as another reminder to parents to have a serious conversation with their school-age children. Let them know the potential consequences of making threats against a school or classmate. Ensure they have a safe space at home to vent frustration and speak about personal issues. Monitor their social media and have a general knowledge of the apps they use and what they are being used for. Most of the threat reports we receive stem from TikTok & Snapchat. Remember, there are phone services out there that allow students to call/text for emergencies but limits their social media footprint and hinders their access to everything the internet has to offer. Do your homework to keep your students safe. Maybe it's not a school threat, but social media is often a breeding ground for bullying and other harassing behaviors.

COMMUNITY CARE

We have used some of the "Community Care" gift card donations we received in December, to purchase groceries for a resident in need and supplying area bus stops with warming kits, blankets and coats during a recent cold snap. Captain Veen and Officer Harkema met with area church leaders to discuss expanding the Community Care Initiative and learn what services area churches provide that may be of help to road patrol as they respond to calls for service.



COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Our Community Outreach Officer has begun conducting several Civilian Response to Active Shooter events lessons for local businesses. Look for the announcement of an education opportunity on the topic to be available to the community soon. Our department wrapped up Mental Health Awareness training in January. Lessons included how to better respond to those in mental health crisis, how to work with area mental health services, and highlighted exactly what those services are. Network 180's Mobile Crisis Team attended the training to showcase their new mobile unit, available to respond to mental health related calls when requested. Since the start of the pandemic, we have seen a mental health component on many of our calls, so this was timely and valuable training.

Don't worry! Our crews will be cutting branches equally around the trees in order to keep them looking uniform. We appreciate your patience as crews work this in between their other duties.





Engineering Department

Residents and business owners will see a quiet year in terms of city sponsored road closures. We have a number of projects in the design phase, but our major and local road network will be free of large-scale obstructions in 2022. However, the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) has several regional projects that might impact Walker residents.



CITYWIDE ROADS

Walker will also be performing some preventative maintenance on both major and local roads. These projects generally involve minimal delays and include crack sealing, micro sealing, chip sealing, patching and shallow depth overlays of new pavement. In 2022 the following list of streets will get significant attention:

Major Roads:

- Leonard Street asphalt overlay from Kinney Avenue to Remembrance Road.
- West River Drive surface treatment (mircoseal) from Turner Avenue to Bertha Street.

Local Roads:

- Asphalt overlays are expected on Nixon Avenue, 10th Street, Lamont Avenue, Lamont Court, Blythe Ellen Court, Rolling Green Drive, Cummings Court, Holton Court, Coventry Drive, Abington/Woodmont, Needham Court, and Ipswich Drive.
- Roads receiving surface treatments (microseals) will be Sunrise Lane, Sunrise Court, Maplerow Avenue, Sunset Hills Avenue, Sunset Hills Court, and 10th Street.

Private projects will be driving a lot of roadwork this year. New developments will result in several miles of new road and public utilities. New phases are anticipated for residential plats including Winchester Woods, Cambridge Grove, and Summerbrooke Estates. We will also see major land use changes on 2 golf courses with construction anticipated on both the English Hills and Lincoln Lawns courses. All these privately funded developments will involve new public road and utility connections. We will do our best to minimize the impact on neighbors but small delays come hand and hand with development.

Looking Ahead

The next few years also look very exciting. The City has received a number of grants that will allow us to take on some much needed upgrades within our public road network. Here is a brief list of enhancements scheduled for years 2023 -2026.

[Bristol Railroad Bridge at Pannell Street](#): We are working on plans to upgrade this 114 year-old structure to allow two lanes of traffic along with a sidewalk. Construction is anticipated in 2023.

[Alpine Avenue – Hillside Drive to Ann Street](#): 2023 will also see a resurfacing of this important section of Alpine Avenue. Handicap ramps will also be upgraded along this project corridor in 2023.

[Kinney Avenue – Leonard Street to Lake Michigan Drive](#): We are planning to reconstruct this narrow section of roadway with a three lane curb and gutter roadway in 2024. The addition of a center turn lane should help with the many residential driveways and the ditches will be enclosed to allow for a sidewalk on both sides of the street.

[Alpine Avenue – Three Mile Road to Hillside Drive](#): In 2026 will resurface this important section of Alpine Avenue. Handicap ramps will also be upgraded along this project corridor to come into compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

[Bristol Sidewalk – Three Mile Road to Pannell Drive](#): Funding has been secured in 2026 to help build sidewalk along Bristol south of Three Mile Road to Pannell.

[Center Drive Roundabout at Weatherford Drive](#): The Center Drive corridor has been the source of traffic related complaints since it's inception. This 2024 project will remove the traffic signal and allow for a single lane roundabout to help increase accessibility of neighboring businesses along with reducing vehicle delay. We also hope to improve access between the commercial properties north and south of Center Drive. (See image below).



Thank you for your continued patience as we expand and maintain our public road system, as well as inspect and support quality infrastructure development around the City. The City Walker continues to look at other local roads for improvement including sidewalk, traffic signal upgrades, and asphalt overlays. KDL Library: Walker Branch

It's the perfect time to visit your local Kent District Library branch. "Besides books, the library provides many popular and costly items that people may need once in a while, such as Wi-Fi hot spots and infrared cameras to check your home insulation efficiency," said Randy Goble, Director of Engagement for KDL. If you check out items from the library instead of purchasing them, you can save hundreds of dollars each year. 


